Family Services OVERVIEW

ENROLLMENT: New members are added one time a year during the Wyandotte Nation Annual Meeting. Completed applications must be received in the Enrollment office by Aug. 15 of each year in order to be considered for enrollment at the Annual Meeting, which is held the 2nd Saturday of each September. The enrollment application must be completed and returned to this office with an ORIGINAL State Certified long form Birth Certificate. For applicants who cannot trace his/her ancestry to the 1937 base roll, proof of ancestry lies with the prospective enrollee. All enrollment applicants are subject to review by the Enrollment Committee.

Youth Program

This program combines winter clothing, school supplies, and extracurricular. Enrolled Wyandotte Nation children aged 3 (as of October 1) to 18 (and enrolled in high school) will be eligible for up to \$700 per fiscal year. Original receipts and applications are required for this program. Parents/guardians may request up to \$400 in Walmart gift cards per year in \$200 increments. Receipts must be returned to be eligible for future gift cards. No income guidelines apply for this program. Please be sure to read the guidelines completely prior to making purchases and submitting. Incomplete applications will be returned. Applications and receipts must be received or postmarked by September 30.

Infant/Toddler Program

This program is available for enrolled Wyandotte Nation children 2 and under who will be eligible for up to \$300 per year. Original receipts and applications are required for this program. Parents/guardians may request up to \$200 in Walmart gift cards per year. Receipts must be returned to be eligible for future gift cards. No income guidelines apply for this program. Please be sure to read the guidelines completely prior to making purchases and submitting. Incomplete applications will be returned. Applications and receipts must be received or postmarked by September 30.

The majority of the Programs facilitated by the Family Services Department are available Nationwide to assist all citizens, regardless of where they reside. Program information and applications can be found on the Tribe's website, picked up from the office, or sent via email. **Unless otherwise noted on the application, program dates are October 1 to September 30.** Please allow up to 30 days for payments to process for all programs. If you have a bank account set-up for direct deposit all payments will be made to the account until such time the Tribe is notified in writing to stop the direct deposit. To ensure that no payments are made to old accounts it is best practice to notify the Tribe two (2) weeks prior to submitting an application for reimbursement.

Eligibility

Any tribal citizen who owes money to a Wyandotte Nation department or program that is past due by 60 days or more will not be eligible for tribally funded services. If you have an outstanding balance, you will receive a notification stating this policy with details of the delinquent account(s) as well as who to contact regarding payment options.

Junior/Senior Assistance

A \$350 High School Junior / Senior Expense Assistance Program is provided to tribal citizens nationwide to help offset the added expenses. The student must state the purpose of the assistance such as yearbook, cap and gown, announcements, letter jacket, pictures, class ring, Junior/Senior trip, college testing, prom, required class specific supplies or other related expense.

Elder Assistance

No income guidelines apply for this nationwide program: Elders age 55 and over are eligible to receive \$350 each year for personal expenses. Payment can be made to a vendor or reimbursed to the tribal citizen. Examples of eligible expenses include vehicle repairs, appliance purchases, insurance, utilities, groceries, fuel, and home repairs. Expenses that are NOT eligible for reimbursement through this program are alcohol, tobacco, lottery, and items/services purchased through the Supplemental Health Program (aka Benny Card).

Senior Energy Assistance

This program is available nationwide for all enrolled Wyandotte citizens age 55+. The program has a maximum benefit of \$350, which will be paid directly to your utility service provider. The application must be accompanied by a complete utility bill that contains the name of the company, account number and dates of service. NOTE: Please continue to pay your bill as it may take up to 30 days for our payment to process on your account.

Burial Assistance

This nationwide benefit of \$3,500 is available for all Wyandotte nation citizens. The benefit is only payable upon death and must be paid directly to the service provider, unless a paid in full receipt is provided along with the application. Completed applications should include a copy of the death certificate and an itemized statement from the service provider.

Child Passenger Safety Seats

The program will provide one (1) seat per enrolled child. Children must either be enrolled or have a completed enrollment application on file. The only exceptions will be for expectant mothers who can have their physician complete the section on the application beginning in their 7th month and babies less than 6 months old. Parents/legal guardians can choose to either purchase the seats and be reimbursed up to \$200 or have the Family Services staff purchase the seat to be shipped. If applying for reimbursement, receipts must include the following: date, item purchase, item price, subtotal, tax, grand total and payment method (Visa, MC, PayPal, etc.). This program is available nationwide.

Enrolled Wyandotte Nation citizens who reside in "Oklahoma Indian Country" may register and title their vehicles with the Tribe. Please keep in mind that the tribal citizens name **MUST** be on the title at the time of assignment, if there is a lien on the vehicle, Tax Commission staff can not add or remove names to the title without permission from the lending agency. Fees associated with this process include an annual registration fee, title fee and sales tax. There are also fees for lien entries and duplicate items (title, registration, decal, etc.).

For new tags you must have the following:
Original State Title
Insurance verification
Wyandotte tribal membership card (not CDIB)

For renewals, you must have the following:
Insurance verification. Renewals and new tags received without insurance verification will be returned. Tribal citizens will be receiving a new license plate upon renewal with a new design.

Handicap Tags: Individuals who are interested in receiving a handicap license plate should either come by the office or call to obtain a form. The form will need to be completed by your primary care physician.

Tags: Purchasing Vehicles



What to do when purchasing a vehicle from a dealership and trading in your used vehicle:

1. Remove the tribal tag from your trade-in vehicle.
2. Tell the dealership that you will be registering your vehicle with your tribe, and you will need the following: An actual title (not an electronic title) and a temporary paper tag.
3. The dealership will issue a temporary paper tag that expires 10 days from purchase.
4. Within those 10 days, appear in the tribal tag office with your documents from the dealership. (Bill of Sale and Finance documents)
5. Once the tribal tag office has verified that the buyer is eligible for a tribal tag, we will issue a numbered license plate (or transfer a previously issued plate – Veteran or personalized plate) and a temporary decal that expires within 30 days.
6. After receiving the title for your new vehicle, you must return to the tribal tag office to complete the registration process and receive your title, registration, and decal which will be good for one year from the month of registration.

What to do when purchasing a used vehicle from a private owner:


1. The seller or buyer must pre-register the vehicle listing the new owner's information within two days from the date of sale to receive a temporary paper tag that expires in 10 days.
2. At any time during those 10 days, you may register your vehicle with the tribal tag office and receive your title, registration, and decal which will be good for one year from the month of registration.

Supplemental Health Benefit point.c

Tribal citizens 18 and over are eligible for a \$1,500 benefit for medical/health related expenses and tribal citizens who have enrolled Wyandotte Nation dependents will receive an additional \$1,000 for a max family benefit of \$2,500.

Point • c is the new company managing the cards. Tribal citizens should have received the new cards in the mail.

- Program dates are January 1-December 31.
- You have until February 28th to file a reimbursement claim for the previous year, this can be done through the website, app or by submitting a paper claim form (this form can be found on our website under the Family Services section)
- If your card is used after January 1st the expense will come out of your current year funding.
- You can check card balances 24/7 at 877-267-3359.
- Keep in mind you will NEVER use your SSN for this program; you will only use your Wyandotte Nation roll number.



477 Services PROGRAM

Employment, Education & Training

We provide services for job training and work experience as well as educational assistance. Financial assistance is provided for classroom training, vocational training, and other job readiness services. Employment services may be described as entering, transitioning, or dislocated within the workforce.

These services include, but are not limited to:

Childcare Services

This service is designed to assist low income families in paying for their daycare needs. Eligible families have children ages 0 through 12 years old, meet income criteria, and have provided required documentation. The goal is to increase access to high quality childcare and ensure continuity of care, enabling families to maintain gainful employment, pursue career advancement or obtain their educational goals.

Youth Services

We offer a wide range of services for the benefit of youth including childcare, education, employment preparation, and other supportive services.

Our goal is to create safe and stable families, raise educational achievement, develop and enhance employment opportunities, integrate employment and training services, and increase self-sufficiency. Wyandotte Nation's 477 Program serves all counties within a 100-mile radius from Wyandotte, Okla.



LIHEAP

The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program is a federal program that provides financial and energy assistance to low-income households for heating and cooling costs, energy crises, and weatherization. It offers one-time payments and helps prevent energy shut-offs. Eligibility and benefit amounts are based on factors like income, household size, and energy costs.

Related Supportive Services

Support Services, financial or not, may be available to all youth and adults. Requests for support services may require additional documentation as outlined in Policy. Our focus is helping our clientele achieve economic self-sufficiency and not relying on public assistance.

Indian Child Welfare Services

This program is designed to help keep children in their homes with the family or ensure that if there is a need for removal that federal guidelines are adhered to and the best interest of the child is first and foremost. If your family is in a situation where the state is involved, please contact either of the ICW Social Workers.

The Tribe is continually seeking foster families. If you are interested in sharing your home with a child in need, please contact us.

Crime Victim Services



Services are available for Native and non-native women, men, and children that reside within a 100-mile radius of tribal headquarters. The Wyandotte Nation aims to address the urgent safety needs, economic stability, and long-term needs of victims with the goal of aiding in the development of self-sufficiency. Services are not dependent upon a victim's involvement in the criminal justice system.

Willow House

The Victim Services Program's new home expands the services they can provide, and do so in one place.

The name 'Willow House' was inspired by tribal ancestors' belief that the willow tree represents the perpetual renewal of life after a winter of famine.

Services

Some of the crimes they provide support for include: domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, child abuse, teen dating violence, elder abuse, trafficking, MMIP, and survivors of homicide.

Advocates work to build self-sufficiency for victims of crime through advocacy, direct services and outreach and awareness. Advocates strive to provide each victim/survivor with the essentials for a safe, stable and thriving future.

Education OVERVIEW

Child Development Center

The Wyandotte Nation Child Development Center's goal is to provide the highest quality of childcare possible. We strive to create meaningful, lasting relationships with our students and their families so that we can best serve each individual. We take great pride in the care and instruction that our staff provides to our children. Services we provide include: Preschool, Infant Program, One Year Old Program, Toddler Program, Before/After School Program, and a Summer Program.

Preschool & Toddler Program

The Preschool Program has received national recognition as one of the best preschool programs in the country. The children (3+ years old) are given an early start in education efforts by learning academic, social, and recreational skills. The Infant / Toddler Programs serve children from ages 0 to 3 years old, and operate year round.



Extended, Afterschool, & Summer Programs

These programs generate revenue to help maintain the early childhood program of the Wyandotte Nation. Our early childhood services are now available year around.

Library Services

Wyandotte Nation Historical Library offers a wide range of book and dvd selections, a computer lab, free wifi, printing and faxing, Little Free Libraries throughout the local community, and an online library database. We have also introduced new programs: Story Book Walks, Movie Nights, and Create a Book Club, Art Club, STEM Club or Garden Club. To become a patron, please visit our library or visit the Wyandotte Nation website's Library section under Education to apply online.

Library hours are Monday through Thursday 8am to 4:30pm and Friday 8am to 3:30pm.

Undergraduate

The Undergraduate scholarships are worth \$6,000 (beginning Spring 2026) per semester for full-time enrollment, renewable for up to 8 semesters; providing the students continue to meet the guidelines established by the Education Program.

Part-time students, and quarter system schools, are funded on a per hour basis. The Wyandotte Nation values education and this program is designed to assist citizens in obtaining a post-secondary education.

Doctoral

Doctoral Scholarships are awarded to enrolled Wyandotte tribal citizens who are attending or will be attending a Doctoral Graduate Program at an accredited university. The program offers funding of \$6,000 per semester.

Vocational

Vocational Scholarships provide assistance for income-qualified students in attending technical schools where the participants will be job ready in two years. This program provides assistance for citizens who are wanting to learn a skill, knowledge, or craft in a specific employment or trade field. Vocational scholarships are awarded on the same requirements as the undergraduate scholarships.

Masters

Masters Scholarships are available to enrolled Wyandotte Tribal citizens who have completed a bachelors degree and are pursuing a more advanced degree. This program has a four semester life span.

Wyandotte Nation Scholarship Program

The deadline for fall submission is May 1 and the deadline for spring submission is Nov. 1. College graduates may also submit an application on the website for Wyandotte Nation Graduation Stoles. Stoles are available to college graduates who have participated in the Scholarship Program and are also available to tribal citizens who are graduating college but did not obtain a scholarship from the Wyandotte Nation. The stoles are not for High School graduates. The Wyandotte Nation Education Honor Cord is available for current graduating high school seniors who are registered tribal citizens.

Concurrent

Concurrent Scholarships are available to Wyandotte tribal citizens who are enrolled in high school and are taking college courses. Funding assists students with dual enrollment as they begin course work on the college level prior to HS graduation. Many states waive the cost of tuition and we assist with the fees.

Title VI Program

We provide free lunches 5 days a week to elderly Indian people 55 years of age or over. Menu subject to change, you can find it here:

Serving time is 11:30 am to 1 pm. CDIB card required and spouses are also eligible to eat free. Guest meals are \$7 and children 12 & under are \$5. Volunteers eat for free (bringing elders food or taking elders food). We also host around 10 special events per year, including holiday parties and more!

Other services we provide: Transportation, information and referrals; Host and transport special events throughout the year (Fairs, festivals and shopping trips); Host eye and ear screening, and foot care clinics upon request from outside contractors; and operate Senior Turtles Gift Shop and Online Sales.

Caregiver Services

We help families caring for an older relative with chronic illness or aging disabilities. The Tribe provides support services for family caregivers and for grandparents raising grandchildren. Services provided can include individual counseling, support groups, training and respite care. Eligibility: Caregivers or families caring for frail persons 55 years of age or older; CDIB card; No income guidelines; Family members 55 years or older who are primary caregivers residing with a child (18 years of age or under).



Housing OVERVIEW

Rental Housing

The Housing Department offers income based rental housing comprised of 2-bedroom, 3-bedroom, and 4-bedroom units. The rental units at Heritage Acres are close by Heritage Acres Park, Splashpad, Title VI, and Bearskin Wellness Center.



Heritage Acres Bear Park

The Park features a walking track, playground equipment, pavilions, picnic tables and a Splash Pad.

Community Center

The Community Center is available to rent for tribal citizens at a discounted rate.

Down Payment Assistance

Assistance is available for first-time homebuyers. Participants in the program must meet income guidelines, be eligible for a conventional loan, and be purchasing a home located within a 50 – mile radius of the Tribal complex.

College Rental Assistance

Available for students who are actively on scholarship through Wyandotte Nation Education Dept, residing in dorms or a rental unit. Assistance available on a first-come, first-serve basis.

IHS-121 Program

Program from IHS that allows us to assist tribal citizens with safe drinking water and proper sanitation facilities. Available as a one-time service for tribal citizens residing in the following Oklahoma Counties: Craig; Creek; Delaware; Mayes; Nowata; Okfuskee; Ottawa; Rogers; Tulsa; Wagoner; and Washington. Services include well drilling, installation of septic systems/ drain field, rural water hook ups, and connections to city sewer systems.

Health & Wellness OVERVIEW

Bearskin Healthcare & Wellness Center is a community fitness center and health care clinic dedicated to the well-being and physical fitness of our neighbors in the greater Wyandotte, Oklahoma area. Providing you with all your health and healthcare needs, we are actively committed to building a healthier, stronger community.

The mission of the government of the Wyandotte Nation is to improve the quality of life for all Tribal Citizens. This goal is continuously the focus of services provided by Bearskin Healthcare & Wellness Center and is reflected upon as decisions, policies and procedures are created and updated. In carrying out this mission, Bearskin Healthcare staff will abide by all applicable policies / procedures and rules / regulations of all federal, tribal, state, or other regulatory authorities.

Fitness Center Membership

- Free to citizens with Tribal membership.
- Includes tanning and hydro massage bed.

Physical Therapy

- Must have a written order or RX from a Bearskin Healthcare Provider or a provider in which Bearskin referred patient to.

Pharmacy

- Must be seen by a provider at Bearskin Healthcare.
- Fills prescriptions written by Bearskin Healthcare providers.
- Prescriptions from outside providers are only filled if approved by and re-written by a Bearskin Healthcare provider under his/her authority.
- Mail order is now available: 30 day supply; No controlled RX will be mailed.





Are you a resident within the Bearskin Healthcare Service Delivery area?

Patients living **within the Purchased/Referred Care (PRC) Service Delivery Area:** Wyandotte or Eastern Shawnee Tribal Citizens who reside in the following counties: Ottawa, Craig, Mayes, Wagoner, Delaware, Rogers, Okmulgee, Nowata, Tulsa, Creek, Okfuskee and Washington.

Eligibility

- Patient must be an active patient, with a visit once every 3 years.
- Patient must complete an Alternate Resource Form (ARF).
- Patient must have current Oklahoma Driver's License or Oklahoma Identification on file.
- Patient must have Tribal Membership Card on file.
- Patient must have insurance or Soonercare denial on file, and Affordable Care Act proof of eligibility.
- Patient must sign a rules agreement (every 3 years).
- Must meet residency requirements – utility bill in patients name with physical address – lease agreement, gas, electric, internet, cable.
 - If only one utility bill, the following documents will be acceptable as the second document – previous years taxes (front page verifying state), land tax statement, recent school records, mortgage statement
 - For individuals that do not have 2 of the above documents and reside with other individuals – notarized affidavit verifying residence will be accepted.

Dental

- Patient must meet the requirements (LIST-ED LEFT).
- Appointment must be authorized prior to visit (Please allow 2 weeks minimum).
- Must use provider within insurance network or contracted with Bearskin Healthcare.

Optometry

- Must be seen by provider at Bearskin Healthcare once every three years to be eligible.
- Must be authorized prior to visit.
- Must use provider within insurance network or contracted with Bearskin Healthcare.
- \$250 for single vision – includes one exam and one pair of glasses OR contacts.
- \$300 for multi-focal vision – includes one exam and one pair of glasses OR contacts.

Audiology

- Patient must meet the above requirements (LISTED LEFT).
- Appointment must be authorized prior to visit (Please allow 2 weeks' minimum)

Patients living **OUTSIDE** the Purchased / Referred Care (PRC) Service Delivery Area

Adult Dental

- Must be seen by provider at Bearskin Healthcare once every three years to be eligible.
- Must be authorized prior to visit.
- Up to \$750 per year, excludes orthodontics and whitening.

Children's Dental

- Must be seen by provider at Bearskin Healthcare once every three years to be eligible.
- Must be authorized prior to visit.
- Services must be provided by a provider within insurance network or by a Bearskin Contracted provider.
- Services excluded are orthodontics and whitening.
- AS FUNDING ALLOWS

Adult Emergency Dental

- Must be seen by provider at Bearskin Healthcare once every three years to be eligible.
- Must be authorized prior to visit.
- Services must be provided by a provider within insurance network or by a Bearskin Contracted provider.
- Up to \$1000 per year.
- Services provided – limited x-ray, limited exam, extractions, re-cementing of crowns, partials and/or dentures, wisdom teeth removal.
- AS FUNDING ALLOWS

Optometry

- Must be seen by provider at Bearskin Healthcare once every three years to be eligible.
- Must be authorized prior to visit.
- Must use provider within insurance network or contracted with Bearskin Healthcare.
- \$250 for single vision – includes one exam and one pair or glasses OR contacts.
- \$300 for multi-focal vision – includes one exam and one pair or glasses OR contacts.

Environmental Department activities include recycling, educational events, water sampling, tire collection events, and more. We also host an annual Environmental Festival and Tire Collection event. Both Surface water and drinking water are sampled for quality in our tribal jurisdiction. Under the NPS program, area septic systems are inspected and we completed one septic improvement. The Department manages three EPA programs which are now rolled into a Performance Partnership Grant or PPG. We also manage the Lost Creek Recycling Center.

Lost Creek Recycling Center

We have a collection route that services the Wyandotte Nation departments and businesses, the Heritage Acres Housing Complex, and also businesses in the Town of Wyandotte, and the Wyandotte schools.

Items we recycle: 1 Plastics (clear plastics such as pop bottles, juice bottles, etc.), #2 Plastics (milk jugs), Newspaper, Office Paper, Magazines, Aluminum and Tin Cans, Cardboard, and Shredded Office Paper.

Items we do not recycle: Glass, styrofoam, medical waste (syringes/needles), plastic grocery sacks, clothing, and large appliances (stoves, refrigerators, etc.).




